## THE LAUNCESTON VOLUNTEER ARTILLERY CORPS

This narrative was taken from the menu of the 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Dinner of the Launceston Volunteer Artillery and 6<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment RRAA held 6<sup>th</sup> June 1970 in the Launceston Hotel. The narrative was inscribed on a plaque which was unveiled at the hotel by Colonel C.M Fotheringham, ED, Colonel Commandant of Artillery, Tasmania Command

The Launceston Voluntary Artillery Corps was formed as a result of this Advertisement in the Launceston "Examiner", of June 5<sup>th</sup>, 1860.

"Launceston Citizens' Volunteer Rifle Corps – The government having accepted the offer of service of the above Corps, the subscribing members are requested to attend the Launceston Hotel on Wednesday evening, 7<sup>th</sup> June, at 7 o'clock, for the purpose of taking the oath of allegiance and other important business."

At this meeting, after the reading of a letter from the Colonial Secretary it was unanimously resolved that the name of the Corps be changed to "Launceston Volunteer Artillery Corps". Three companies of fifty men each were formed under Captain R.C.B. Home and training commenced. Members supplied themselves with uniforms and paid an entrance fee of 2s.6d and a further amount of 2s. monthly. Officers were elected annually.

From 1866 the corps manned the 8 inch smooth bore guns at Fort Cormiston. These guns and other historical items may be seen at Patterson Barracks, Launceston. Two 2.5 mountain guns used from 1884 are now located at Anglesea Barracks, Hobart.

From 1870 to 1878 Government support was withdrawn from the Volunteer movement and all Corps with the exception of the L.V.A. were disbanded in 1875. Throughout this "winter of neglect" the Corps continued to parade, under command of Captain Alfred Harrap, which earned it the distinction of being the oldest continuously serving Volunteer artillery in the British Commonwealth outside Britain.

Members saw service in every major campaign from Soudan in 1885 to Vietnam in 1965. The most highly decorated Australian in World War 1, Lt –Col H. Murray, VC. CMG, DSO & bar, DCM, Croix de Guerre, was introduced to army service during six years with the L.V.A.

6<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment, the present serving unit traces it origins to "Hobart Town Volunteer Artillery" 1859-1875, "Southern Tasmanian Volunteer Artillery" 1878-1902 and "Launceston Volunteer Artillery: 1860-1970. It is represented in Launceston by RHQ, H.Q. Battery and 16 Field Battery, and in Hobart by 112 Field Battery and Light Aid Detachment.

This plaque was unveiled by Colonel C.M Fotheringham, ED, Colonel Commandant of Artillery, Tasmania Command at a Commemorative Dinner attended by members of the Corps.
